BA Program in Africana Studies

The Bachelor of Arts degree in Africana Studies is designed to give students a broad-based education in the study and analysis of the global Africana diaspora while offering students an opportunity to specialize in a concentration area of their choice. The BA Program consists of three sets of requirements: Core (15 units), Breadth (9 Units) and Concentration – Cultural Studies or Social Sciences (12 units).

For students interested in graduate study or careers in the Arts (dance, music, theater), Teaching Careers in English, Literature, and Literary Analysis, Religion and Culture, we recommend selecting the Cultural Studies Concentration.

For students interested in graduate study or careers, in History, Law, Psychology, or Sociology, we recommend selected the Social Sciences Concentration.
